WHO CAN ENROLL?

Any child from newborn to Kindergarten (5-6 years old).

WHY START NOW?

As soon as your baby is born, they start learning. Just by talking to, playing with, and caring for your baby, you help them develop language skills necessary to become a reader. 1,000 Books encourages the quality time with your child and helps caregivers foster a learning environment in the home through reading.

Only 3 books a day completes the program in 1 year!

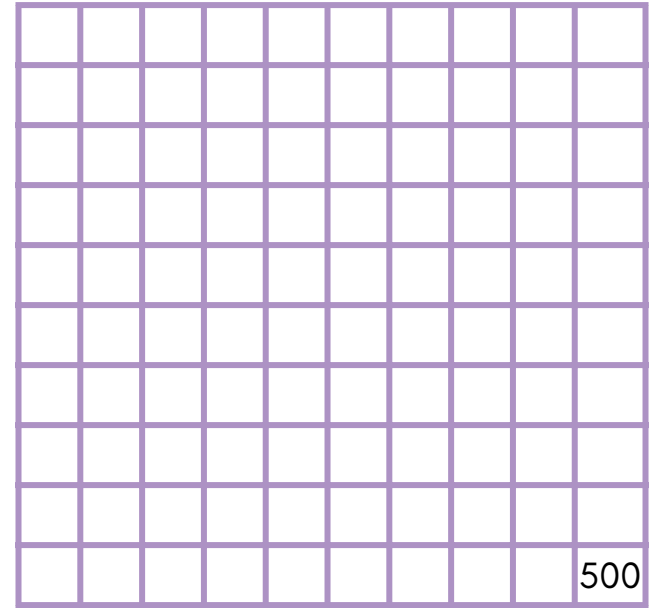
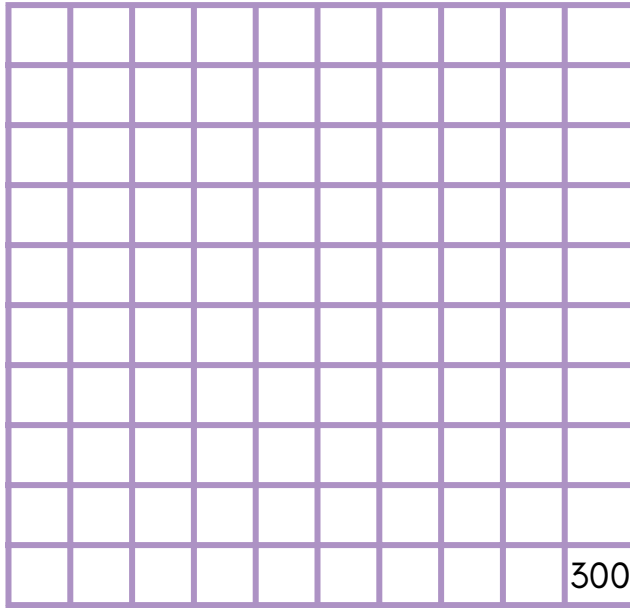
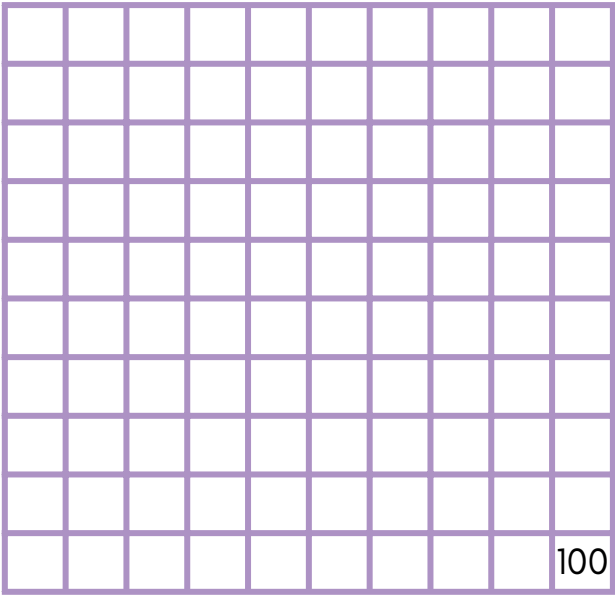
Or reach the goal in less than 3 years with 1 book per day!

TIPS

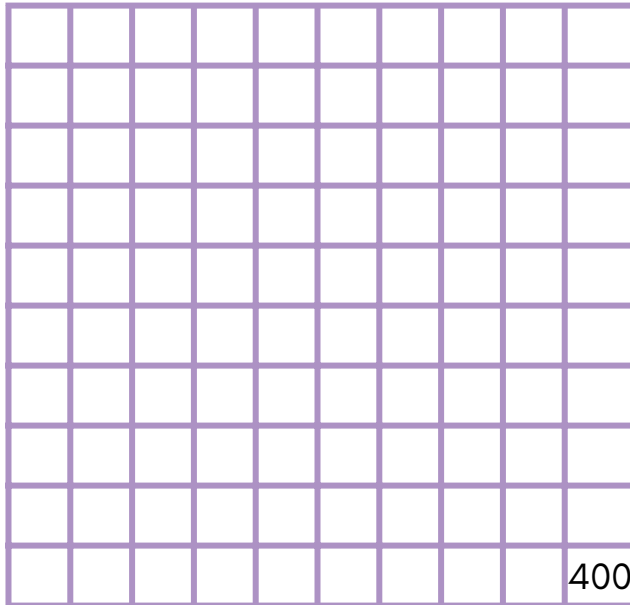
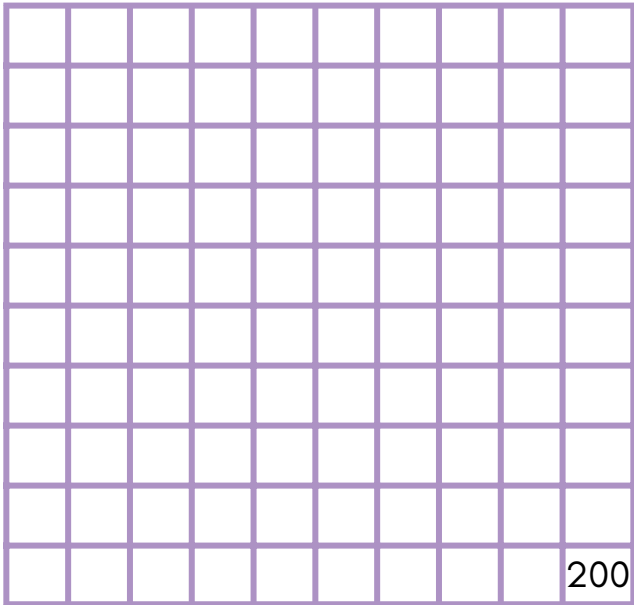
- Develop a routine of reading each day. Same spot, same time, same stuffed animal, etc.
- Let your child "read" the story.
- Play games while reading. Have your child point out a specific letter or color.
- Ask questions. "What do you think will happen next? Does the character look angry or sad or happy?"
- Try rhyming books to learn speech patterns.
- Be expressive while reading. Widen your eyes or change your tone to teach your child how to read emotions along with the words.
- Remember to pause for effect. Try reading the last line slowly for emphasis.
- Have a guest reader. Grandparents, friends, or story time at the library ;)
- Have fun! Snuggle, bounce, clap your hands. Sitting still is not as important as reading aloud routinely.



Young children who are read to early and regularly quickly acquire the skill of listening and the desire to hear stories.

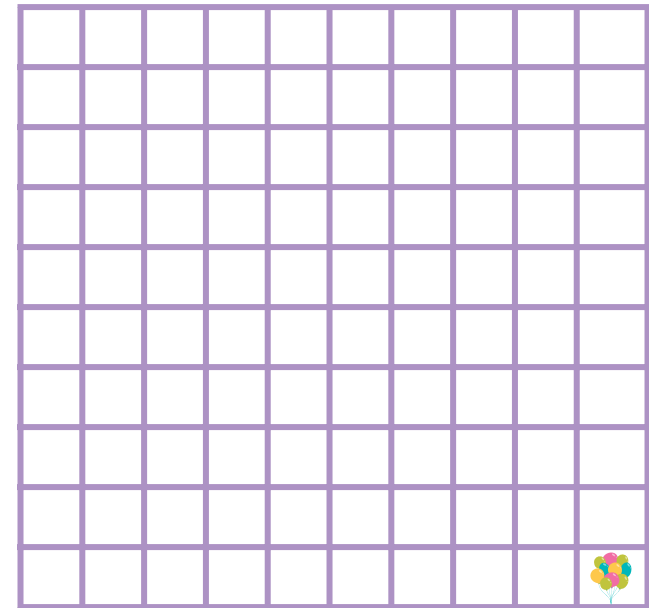
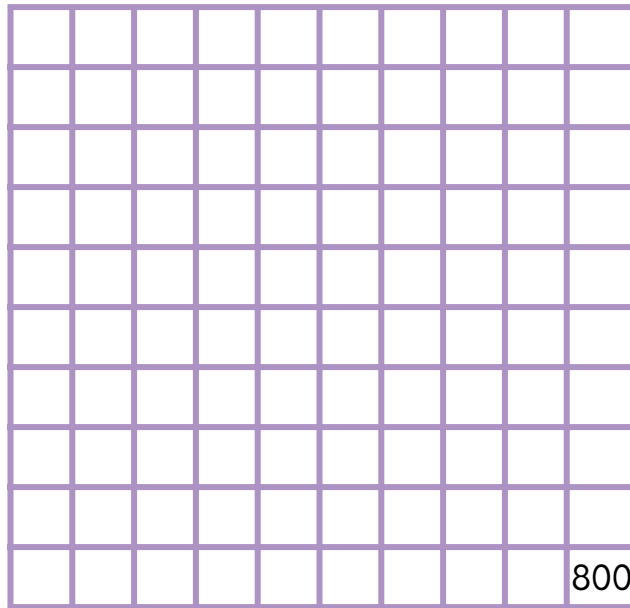
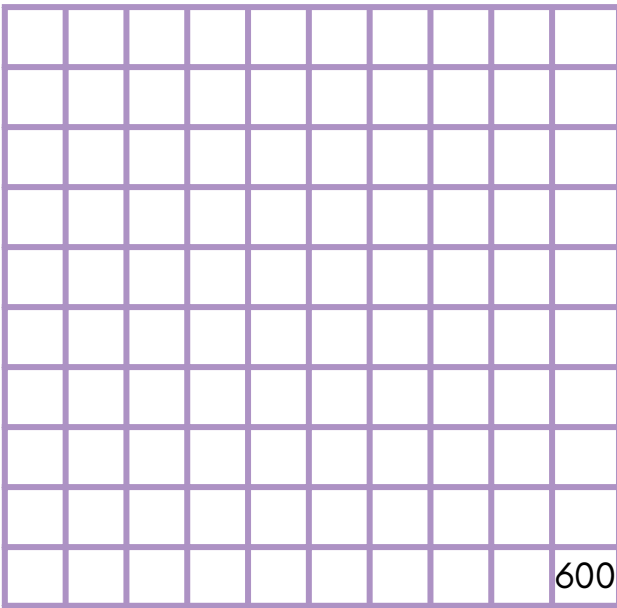
